Truth be told, I love hockey. A number of years ago, a good friend, even older than I am, decided to join an over 35 hockey league. The team he joined was called, "the Geezers". He organized it and had them on the rink ice twice a week. Problem is, they got thumped in their first game, so he sent out an e-mail looking for better players. I guess he wanted folks who could stay upright if they took a shot on goal.

Once upon a time, I skated around frozen rinks at a park not too far from my home. The siren song of lacing up a pair of skates and donning a bunch of equipment made my heart race. Two reasons made my joining the league impossible. The first was, I can't because I'm scheduled—book club. The second was vastly more salient: I'm old. I don't like to think about what might happen to this body of mine should I skate, swing my stick hard, or even skate fast—or try to--for that matter. This mortal coil had done nothing close to any of the above for more than a decade. Who knows what horrors I would suffer?

No matter—if I wouldn't have been at the book club, I would have been at the rink. I would have. I swear. At least, I think I would have. A friend of mine remembers the day his father, 70+, looked at him sardonically when this friend complained of some minor muscle ache. "Get used to it," he said, with far more authority than sympathy. I'm there. Most mornings when I wake, I walk upstairs slowly, my body occasionally braced up against the wall, my back crooked, knees bent. My silhouette against the dim kitchen lights must resemble Notre Dame's most famous hunchback. And it is not getting any better.

I wash small loads of wash lately because once a week at least a perfectly good shirt, a perfectly clean shirt, jumps off my chest to catch curry sauce or pasta sauce. I get so angry, I wash them right away to destroy evidence.

But this friend of mine—the man who was warned by his father to get used to his aches and pains—right now is dying of lung cancer. He says in a note that his aches are different because now, he says, "I will never again be able to draw a full two-lungs'-worth of breath. I will ever puff at a flight of stairs. This body will nevermore be what it has been, nor can I frame my knowing it according to its ability to repair itself."

And, he says, he'll never get better. He's busy "devising methods for living the diminishing life." And he still says, "Praise the Lord." He still says, "Hallelujah." Just doesn't have as much lung to proffer that praise.

I'd like to think I could still skate and score, but I was a whole lot safer at a book club.

This past Sunday was Easter. On the Monday after Easter, Barb and I walked the Athens bike path, just past the Beaumont area, to see the bluebells, violets, and trillium that dot the hillsides. I walked it with the sure knowledge that what's there had risen with new life following this winter. It will surely rise again next year with new life, more of God's beauty and bounty. This morning we rise in the sure knowledge of faith that Geezers in spotless shirts who call upon God's name will someday skate like Wayne Gretzky and make saves like Martin Brodeur. He is risen. Hallelujah!

Windows ON: Mission Outreach Committee GUEST PREACHER, JOAN STEWART

Joan Stewart, Presbyterian Minister and Executive Director of West Virginia Ministry of Advocacy and Workcamps (WVMAW) preached on Sunday, April 7th. Scripture was taken from Micah 1:1-8 and Matthew 6:24-34.

In her thought-provoking sermon, Joan began by pulling a small statue of a gargoyle from her bag. The gargoyle represents the opposite of logical. Faith, too, is often the opposite of logical. This reminds us that life itself is not logical. We are often afraid of what we do not understand just as Joan's grandson was fearful of the gargoyle until she gave it the name "Steve". If you give a name to what you fear, it loses its' power over you.

In West Virginia, people have many fears – flooding, unemployment, handicaps, illness and poverty. Where there is hope, fear does not destroy. God promises us a Kingdom. It can be ours, here on Earth, now. It is up to us to be agents of change in the world in which we live. If we do not make a difference, our peace is at the expense of others. Make this world a place of justice, righteousness, love, kindness and walk humbly. Build bridges between those who have and those who do not. Build relationships.

It is easy to give money and items to people that you will never see. God calls us to see the people and give them a hand up. Stop thinking of ourselves and serve God. Respond and bring justice to those in need.

There are glimpses of God's Kingdom on Earth in WVMAW. Volunteers come from all over and provide a little justice to families. They give people freedom when they install ramps and a warm, dry, comfortable place for others. There are stories of panic by flood victims and others in need. Volunteers hold the hands of the needy, the disabled. They share a meal with others and with members of their own mission groups. Relationships are built. Joan laughed that one group arrived planning to bring God to West Virginia but found that He is already there!

Volunteers receive more than they give and learn to be guided by God. We are a community of believers – reaching out beyond our walls. What do you worry about? Give your fears a name and they will not be as scary. Be the agents of change in building the Kingdom of God. Seek the Kingdom here, now. What you bring to people may be their only glimmer of hope!

Joan stayed after the service to talk to members of the congregation and to sample the Soup and Salad luncheon that had been prepared.

Windows ON: Information on CHIP WHAT IS CHIP?

CHIP program to be offered for First Presbyterian Church members. There are a total of 18 CHIP classes that will be held in Fellowship Hall from 5:30–7:00 p.m., beginning on Tuesday, May 7th and running each Tuesday and Sunday until June 30th.

What is CHIP? The Complete Health Improvement Program (CHIP) is a scientifically proven lifestyle intervention program that can prevent, arrest, and even reverse today's most common diseases. CHIP is conducted worldwide in community organizations and corporations and led by certified facilitators. Within the first thirty days, CHIP can normalize blood pressure, lower cholesterol and triglycerides, reduce BMI, stabilize fasting blood sugar, and reduce or eliminate the need for medications. Over 700 people in Southeast Ohio have benefited from Live Healthy Appalachia's local CHIP program. Each CHIP class offered by Live Healthy Appalachia includes 18 group sessions, including videos, dynamic discussions, and peer support that integrates optimal nutrition, exercise, and behavioral psychology principles. The program also includes two health screenings for total cholesterol, LDL , HDL, triglycerides, fasting blood sugar, height, weight and blood pressure.

Live Healthy Appalachia has agreed to provide the two health screenings for free. FPC will provide space for two meetings per week, use of the kitchen for meal prep, DVD player and TV. The cost of the program would be \$200.00 per person. This fee will cover the cost of the facilitator and the meals provided at each of the sessions. Scholarships are available. Church members who have been part of CHIP include: Rev. Martin, Neal Nesbitt, Sandy Nesbitt, Marge Shelton, Penny Shelton, Bob Stewart, and Megan Tegge.

Windows ON: Genesis Theater QUILTERS

The Genesis Theater Project, in conjunction with the Church Community Committee, is now in rehearsals nearly every night for the June 7-16 production of the historical folk musical, "Quilters," set on the American Prairie of the late 1800's. This all-female musical deals with an elderly mother and her nine daughters, who re-live a lifetime of memories of home, church, and community, all in the creation of quilt blocks to be used in a family Legacy Quilt.

The cast, (*see picture*), includes OU students Mary Rizzardi, Faline Bailey, and Alenka Fairley, church congregation members Alli Purcell and Mindy King (as the mother), and community members Katie Herron, Myca Haynes Beauvais, Myra Waterbury, Andrea Thompson-Hashman, and Reagan Neviska.

The show is directed by David Tadlock and Connie Hunter, with Danielle Bridges as stage manager/Asst. Music Director, Alexis Parsons as choreographer, and Nellie Werger and Teresa Caldwell on historical costumes.

The show is currently in fund-raising stages to pay for the large budget covering 1880s costumes, historical props and set pieces, and many other production costs. Since a live pit orchestra of six folk musicians is also needed at \$300 for each musician, the theater group is looking for backers to fund each musician, as well as \$500 for creation of the quilts and 16 specific quilt blocks used in the show. The quilts are already in the process of being pieced and sewn by volunteer quilters at Log Cabin Quilt Shop in Marietta, OH (*see picture*).

COLLEGE LUNCH - THEATER STAR DINES AT COLLEGE LUNCH

From April 4th through April 13th, the Ohio University School of Theater presented the Shakespeare classic Romeo and Juliet. During the weekly free college lunch in fellowship hall, diners had a chance to rub elbows with both the lead actor and actress, who have become regular college-lunch attendees. This month's featured diner is Jackson Savage, who played Romeo. In a future edition, we hope also to focus on Juliet.

Jackson is a senior from Cincinnati majoring in the bachelor of fine arts theater program. He enrolled at Ohio University after earning a degree in forestry at Hocking College in Nelsonville. While in Nelsonville, he became involved in community theater while performing at the Stuart Opera House there. One noteworthy performance was as Cliff Bradshaw, an important character in the famous musical Cabaret. Bradshaw was portrayed as an American writer living in Berlin during the tumultuous 1930s as Hitler's Nationalist Socialists came to power. portray emotions such as joy,

Jackson also had a taste of comedy, taking part in a musical called Hair Spray. He hopes this varied experience will prepare him well for the challenging task of acting as a career. Broadway remains a key goal for aspiring actors, as do strong theater programs in Atlanta, Los Angeles, Chicago, Toronto, Vancouver, B. C. and a few other large cities. However, modern technology makes it possible to produce films and get them play dates even in a remote area like southeastern Ohio.

Dramatic performance allows one to enhance awareness and involvement in causes that he or she feels strongly about. As a forestry student, Jackson developed a strong commitment to the environmental movement. He envisions possibly producing a play or movie that would portray the environment as it was, say, 100 years ago, today, and 100 years into the future.

Seemingly an actor must often

sadness, love, or hate as his or her character demands. Jackson was asked how one summons such emotion while playing a part.

"It generally isn't feasible to daydream that one is angry or happy in order to portray that emotion convincingly," he responded. "The actor must concentrate on doing what the play calls for. When one does that, the emotion tends to occur naturally – sort of forming icing on the cake."



First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - AFPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffy, author of the McGuffy's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
