I don't know how exactly--or who--told me I had to read <u>Beloved</u>. I do remember having a single copy of three Toni Morrison novels--one of them was <u>Song of Solomon</u>-on my shelf, but I hadn't read it by 1987, when <u>Beloved</u> was published. I remember wanting to read her novels partly because she was from Lorain, Ohio, not that far from Toledo, where I grew up. My guess is that when it won the Pulitzer, I picked it up. <u>Beloved</u> got wonderful press right from the start.

Toni Morrison's <u>Beloved</u> is a searing story about slavery, even though it's set a decade or so after the Emancipation Proclamation. At the heart of things is Lethe, once a runaway slave, a mother who left the horrors behind, but never really could. She spent her years as haunted by "the schoolteacher," her evil slave-master, as she was by the child she killed with her own hands, when she determined that death was not as horrible as the institution of slavery. <u>Beloved</u> employs the supernatural wonderfully--ghosts speak from the recesses of Lethe's haunted memories and her guilty soul.

All of that sounds perfectly awful, I guess, and some would say so, I'm sure. But really great literature--and I'm thinking of Marilynne Robinson's <u>Gilead</u> too--create characters of such power that they continue to haunt a reader, as does Toni Morrison's Lethe. When a novel takes you so deeply into a character's heart and soul, the character takes on a life of his or her own-and so it is with <u>Beloved</u>.

The character Toni Morrison names as "Beloved" seems an embodied ghost of the child Lethe had murdered rather than have her live as a slave. That character or memory or ghost is not only difficult but a powerful and a sometimes undeniably evil force.

When finally she leaves, Lethe is heartbroken. "She was my best thing," she tells Paul D her sometimes companion who has also suffered the horror of slavery. And then comes the most beautiful line, a final line that shines bright as eternity from the darkness of the novel, when Paul D says, "You your best thing, Sethe."

There's lot of Beloved that's no longer fresh in my memory, but that last life-affirming line I took to heart and remember.

Beloved is as primary to slavery <u>Sophie's</u> <u>Choice</u> is to the Holocaust. Years ago, I watched Alex Haley's Roots and began to take a deliberate look at my own ethnic heritage and history. I've never read Uncle Tom's Cabin, but I'm well aware of how that novel opened eyes that had been closed tight before.

No matter. To me, the book about slavery and its horrific effects is Toni Morrison's <u>Beloved</u>. If you want to understand the legacy of slavery, read it. It's not easy. It may well be my favorite novel of all time.

Toni Morrison died last month. She was 88 years old. When she was awarded the Nobel Prize for literature, the Swedish Academy said her "novels were characterized by visionary force and poetic import," through which she "gives life to an essential aspect of American reality."

There has been horror and violence in our land in recent weeks much of it based on the tone and rhetoric of our national dialogue. When we reference minorities and people of color as somehow less than real Americans, it contributes to the ravages of a divided nation.

It would be wonderful to believe that if we were to set aside a weekend sometime soon and read <u>Beloved</u>, some of us might come to understand the legacy of a national history that includes more than glib clichés about how we can be great again. This morning, I'm grateful for Toni Morrison's <u>Beloved</u>, and her lifetime of contributions to our understanding of ourselves. ~~ Pastor Rob

CHIP program to be offered for First Presbyterian Church members. There are a total of 18 CHIP classes that will be held in Fellowship Hall from 5:00 p.m. - 6:30 p.m., beginning on Sunday, September 8th and meeting each Sunday and Wednesday until November 6th. Since the summer months were difficult for folks schedules, we have the opportunity to have the classes this fall.

The Complete Health Improvement Program (CHIP) is a scientifically proven lifestyle intervention program that can prevent, arrest, and even reverse today's most common diseases. CHIP is conducted worldwide in community organizations and corporations and led by certified facilitators. Within the first 30 days, CHIP can normalize blood pressure, lower cholesterol and triglycerides, reduce BMI, stabilize fasting blood sugar, and reduce or eliminate the need for medications. Over 700 people in Southeast Ohio have benefited from Live Healthy Appalachia's local CHIP program. Each CHIP class offered by Live Healthy Appalachia includes 18 group sessions, including videos, dynamic discussions, and peer support that integrates optimal nutrition, exercise, and behavioral psychology principles.

The program also includes two health screenings for total cholesterol, LDL, HDL, triglycerides, fasting blood sugar, height, weight and blood pressure.

Live Healthy Appalachia has agreed to provide the two health screenings for free. The church will provide space for two meetings per week, use of the kitchen for meal prep, DVD player and TV. The cost of the program would be \$200.00 per person. This fee will cover the cost of the facilitator and the meals provided at each of the sessions. Scholarships are available. International Peacemakers are available for visits from September 13th-October 7th. Before and after their iteration they will gather in Louisville at the Presbyterian Mission Agency for orientation and debriefing.

The Presbyterian Peacemaking Program makes it possible for leaders from our partner denominations and partner organizations around the world to visit the Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) each year to interpret issues of peace and justice. Since 1984 approximately 300 International Peacemakers from 60 countries have been hosted by Presbyterians. These visits have informed Presbyterians, opened hearts and minds, touched lives, established relationships and inspired new ministries. By sharing stories of their work and witness, the peacemakers help us understand peace and justice concerns around the world and provide insights that can inspire us to greater faithfulness. Their visits broaden our sense of God's inclusive family and help equip us to build a culture of peace and nonviolence for all God's children.



The Presbytery of Scioto Valley is pleased to have from the Dominican Republic, Maria Bock Barett. María Bock Barett is an ordained minister and serves as Coordinator of Social Action for the Dominican Protestant Church (Iglesia Evangélica Dominicana). She oversees the denomination's major programs aimed at transforming lives in local communities: solar ovens, purified water and community health evangelism (CHE). Even though she first was trained and worked as a chemical engineer, Rev. Bock has served as pastor to a number of marginal, urban congregations in the capital of Santo Domingo as well as working as a volunteer in the social action arm of the church, which she now coordinates.

Maria will be within the bounds of our Presbytery from Friday, September 15th until Thursday, September 19th. She is being hosted by the First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio. We are also fortunate to have with us during this time, Mark Hare who has served as a mission co-worker in the Dominican Republic for over ten years and recently accepted a Mission Co-Worker position in Costa Rica.

This program, offered by the Department of Linguistics at Ohio University, helps young people from abroad improve their Englishlanguage mastery and knowledge of American culture by conversing, in a relaxed way, with native English speakers.

In 2018, college lunch received the first annual Award for Global Engagement from the Ohio University international-studies program. 

October 2019 Newsletter Deadline: Monday - September 23rd

First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - AFPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffy, author of the McGuffy's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
