From the Pastor....

During a recent morning run, I was listening to the Rewatchables podcast, in which old movies get revisited around a number of categories (what's aged the best/worst, most rewatchable scene, overacting award). They were discussing the Penny Marshall film A League of Their Own, which is now 30 years old and tells a semi-historical story of the All-American Girls Professional Baseball League during World War II. Barb has started watching the Amazon Prime miniseries based on the film and filling me in on why she loves it.

One of the nominees for most rewatchable scene was the one between Tom Hanks and Geena Davis when Davis's character, Dottie, decides to leave the team before the World Series because her husband has come home from the war. Despite being a star player, Dottie says, "it just got too hard." Manager Jimmy (played by Hanks) responds,

It's supposed to be hard.
If it wasn't hard, everyone would do it.
The hard is what makes it great.

It's a goosebump line for sure. Do a Google search for best lines from the film, and that one will be near the top, bested only by "There's no crying in baseball." Whether it's raising children, competing in a triathlon, or finishing a doctorate, the satisfaction we get from a task is often proportional to the difficulty. C. Thi Nguyen, a philosopher of games, says, "If you're running a marathon, you're trying to get to a particular point in space. But we don't actually care about being at that point in space in and

of itself, or we would take the easy way. We would take a lift, take an Uber, take a shortcut." The challenge, and the constraints, make the experience gratifying. They give it meaning. But I'd forgotten something important about Jimmy Dugan's speech: it doesn't start there. Here's what Jimmy says to Dottie beforehand:

Baseball is what gets inside you. It's what lights you up. It's meant to be joyful.

Maybe it's the legacy of the protestant work ethic. Maybe it's the fact that so many of us had to brute-force our way through the last couple of years, keeping it together for everyone else. But we focus so much on the hard-makes-it-great part that we forget the light-up part. The latter without any of the former is one of empty achievement. But the former without the latter is a recipe for burnout.

Frequently, what's out of whack isn't the quality of the to-do lists or calendar. The problem is not time management, but energy management. Tend to the inflow and outflow of energy, and burnout becomes less likely. Hard doesn't make it great unless the joy is also inside of us. Without that, hard is just hard.

Yes, every undertaking worth doing is going to have some element of drudgery to it. But I continue to love and be guided by Howard Thurman's great adage: "Don't ask what the world needs. Ask what makes you come alive, and go do it. Because what the world needs is people who have come alive." ~ Rev. Martin

Windows ON: FPC Member MARGIE PHILLIPS SHELTON

Margie Shelton of Athens, Ohio died continued her studies at Webster on August 5, 2022, surrounded by family members. She was 91.

She was born to Violet and Ollie Phillips in Roodhouse, IL on January 29, 1931.

Margie attended college for one year at Southern Illinois University before marrying Ray Shelton. They met on a church youth trip to North Carolina.

In 1962, following attending seminary, Margie and her family moved to Bangkok, Thailand as Southern Baptist missionaries. In the early 1970s they returned to Bangkok. She served as the director of the Baptist Student Center from 1973 until 1976, when they returned to the U.S. In 1977, she continued her undergraduate studies, graduating in 1979 with a degree in psychology from Sacred Heart University. She

University, receiving a master's degree in 1981 in human relations and management with family counseling emphasis.

She worked as a college counselor, started her own counseling service, taught English composition and tutored in a writing center, taught psychology, writing, sociology and ESL before retiring at age 82 and moving to Athens, Ohio.

In Athens, Margie joined First Presbyterian Church, where she had served as a deacon. She joined the Athens Reading Club and served as a board member for a senior citizen organization as well as for Athens Mediation Services, where she also was a facilitator.

Margie is survived by her four children, Becky Shelton (Mary Ellen Lutz, St. Louis), Penny Shelton

(Bob Stewart, Athens, Ohio), Jana Shelton (Merriam, Ks.) and James Shelton (Atlanta, Ga.); a brother, Gerald R. Phillips (Della Phillips, Springfield, Ill.); several grandchildren, and great-grandchildren.

A local celebration of life will be held on September 10th at 2:00 p.m. at Athens FPC. There will be a service in Roodhouse, IL earlier in the month

Music Sunday in the Parish was August 7th with Ann and Glen Goins of the Gospel Wind Group, leading the worship service of gospel music which was enjoyed by the congregation.

In-person Monday Bible School will start again on September 12th from 4:00-5:30 p.m. The theme is "God's Love for Us and Others." Bible School Lessons will be based on Children's Literature relating the stories to appropriate Bible passages. Some of the books included will be: Horton Hears a Who by Dr. Seuss; Dolly Parton's Coat of Many Colors; Pudgy Possum the Brave: How Pudgy got his Name by Kathy Elasky. Along with the story books, the program will include crafts, snack, music, games, bell choir.

Kathy Elasky and Catherine Hare will coordinate the sessions, assisted by volunteers including youth from sixth grade through high school.

Blessing Boxes at both the Amesville Elementary School and at the New England Church building are being supported by the Parish and community members. Both boxes are being widely used by folks of the two communities.

Mark Hare and Jenny Berly Bent McDonald, Presbyterian (USA) mission co-workers report from Costa Rica: "we are working with the Latin American Biblical University with one hundred years of tradition training pastors and other religious leaders coming from all walks of life and all types of

faith traditions throughout Central America, South America and the Caribbean. We coordinate with other members of the staff and students, helping in the university's ongoing effort to create an ethic of Earth Care through gardening, recycling, harvesting rainwater, reducing the use of paper and working towards the elimination of single-use plastics, such as plastic grocery bags. Our particular focus is on taking the work of the university out into the community of Cedros, the neighborhood in which the campus is located."

Mission / Outreach Committee OHIO UNIVERSITY CATS' CUPBOARD



Ohio University students began moving into their dormitory rooms during the week of August 15th. And Cats Cupboard, a food pantry which helps meet their needs for food and other necessities, greeted them with a hearty bobcat roar, handing out cloth masks and hand sanitizer to help combat covid.

As of August 17th, at least 150 new students, mostly freshmen, had signed up as members of Cats Cupboard, according to Merilee Meyer of the OU Dean of Students office, coordinator of the program. This membership allows them to shop at the pantry, on the fifth floor of Baker Center, at least once or twice a month.

Meyer expresses strong gratitude for the continuing donations from members of the First Presbyterian Church. She says the Cupboard would not have reached its current position of strength and growth without AFPC input. And she and her colleagues very much need and hope for continuing support.

In mid-August, open hours at the pantry run from 9:00 a. m.-7:00 p. m. Monday-Thursday, 2:00-7:00 p. m. on Fridays, and 9:30 a. m. to 2:00 p. m. on Saturdays.

So-called grab-and-go items which students can eat quickly, sometimes without putting them in microwave ovens, fly off the shelve, according to Meyer. Mashed-potato cups also are popular. Students have microwaves but not regular ovens in their rooms.

Large packages of such things as toilet paper and laundry soap are welcomed. Sometimes such packages are available at stores for low unit prices. Most students are single and do not need large cans of veggies or sauces, so staff members place large quantities in smaller packages.

Items that are especially needed include sugar, flour, peanut butter, pasta, Asian snacks, and snacks other than granola bars.

Several organizations such as the Southeast Ohio Food Bank, the Atrium Cafe in Athens, and Athens Food Rescue also contribute valuable food items. Each month, Meyer and her staff prepare a list of needed items. Then FPC member, Wendy Toadvine shops for things on the list. Alan and Sue Boyd take these items to the pick-up point, the fourth-floor entrance to Baker Center, between 9:00-11:00 a.m. on the second Tuesday of each month. The next such date is September 13th. In addition, a box has been set up for donations on the second floor of Baker Center. Also, if it more

October 2022 Newsletter Deadline Wednesday, September 21st

First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - FPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffy, author of the McGuffy's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
