From the Pastor....

Years ago, I was invited to share Passover with Jewish friends around their family table. As we moved though the Haggadah, the "order" of the Jewish Seder, I listened attentively to the story of slavery and freedom, oppression and liberation, that is at the core of Jewish identity — a story that one generation passes on to the next. I appreciated the openness of Passover. Those at the table — including non-Jews like me! — are invited into the story as a continuing event of liberation. The meal presents the Jewish past, is celebrated in the present, and presses toward a future of God's justice and freedom.

Maybe because my spiritual attention had been so attuned during the Passover meal, I was struck by a similar openended quality of Easter this year. We as Christians tend to forget that Easter Sunday is the first day of a fiftyday cycle that explores what it means to be Christian — to be part of a community, to live with a sense of freedom from death, and to welcome the Spirit of God into our midst. Resurrection isn't one day. It is the beginning of a Christian story of liberation. Easter presents a past event, is celebrated with joy in the present, and presses toward a future of God's iustice and freedom.

Like Passover, Easter is a continuing event of liberation. It goes on and on. It is an invitation to participate in God's unfolding work of justice. In many church circles, we hear a familiar refrain — "it may be Friday, but Sunday's

coming." Yes. Yes. Yes. But Monday comes after that. Turn on the news — both here and around the world and Monday looks pretty much like Friday. It is as if Sunday didn't matter.

But it is different. Because we say Alleluia — and then we go about the work of redemption and bending that arc of justice until the light of God's liberation breaks over the entire world. Alleluia isn't the last word. It is the first word of a renewed journey. Easter's joy will fade. And we go on — telling the story of a God who hates injustice of every sort, living into love and justice, and passing the work onto the next generation. Sometimes we feast. At other times, we fast. But we make our way through this wilderness toward that land where everyone shall know peace of "vine and fig tree."1

1"Under their vine and fig tree" is a phrase quoted in the Hebrew Scriptures in three different places: Micah 4:4, 1 Kings 4:25, and Zechariah 3:10. George Washington used this phrase multiple times in correspondence throughout his life, and one can find Washington reference it almost fifty times. Of the three passages, it is most likely that he was citing Micah 4:4 in his writings. The section states: "but they shall all sit under their own vines and under their own fig trees, and no one shall make them afraid...."

College lunch will go on summer break after April 27th. Students are encouraged to take advantage of Cats' Cupboard and other free meal opportunities until the FPC College Lunch returns in September.

Many thanks are due to all the people who have cooked and served this winter. FPC guests increased in number and were regular in attendance.

One of the regular diners has been Michael, a recent OU graduate who works for Sojourners Resiliency Center in Athens. Sojourners serves youth ages 12 to 21 with antibullying education, counselling, and job preparation. Sojourners Care Network, a nonprofit organization rooted in Appalachian Ohio,

empowers young people to become healthy, responsible, and productive citizens now and in the future. The programs leverage grant funding with local resources to address critical issues facing young people experiencing and at risk of homelessness, poverty, illiteracy, and mental health issues. The program also provides support to families providing foster and kinship care to children throughout our region, striving to bring normalcy and stability to these vulnerable members of society.

Sojourners was founded in early 1999 by two brothers, Marcus and Richard Games, who saw an opportunity in our region to use asset-based positive youth development principles to address critical needs. Sojourners has grown over the subsequent years, expanding its service delivery to include a variety of programs, beginning with foster care, to now include runaway and homeless youth services, employment training, diploma and GED support, mentoring, leadership development, mental and behavioral health supportive services, and service-learning opportunities. Sojourners Resiliency Center is located on Shaffer Street in Athens.

All of the "lunch bunch" have enjoyed meeting and talking with the students who have joined us.

A Blessing Box has been set up in Amesville in front of the Amesville Elementary School and also at the church in New England for use by anyone in the community. Items to give or take include: unopened non-perishable foods; new personal care items (toothpaste, deodorant, menstrual products; laundry detergent, etc. Clean clothing in good repair – socks, gloves, hats, coats, The Parish Folk are supporting this project with money received from the monthly 2-cent-a-meal offering.

Kathy Nice, Transitional General Presbyter for the Presbytery of Scioto Valley, conducted the worship service on April 23rd. A coffee hour followed the service. It is encouraged to invite Kathy Nice to come and take part in any activity that you may be having. Her enthusiasm is contagious!

Change in Church Loading Zone Signage

The City of Athens has removed the church loading zone sign and repainted the curb red.

Windows ON: Mission/Outreach Committee OHIO UNIVERSITY CAT'S CUPBOARD

Large numbers of Ohio University students and their families continue to get needed food and other life necessities from Cats' Cupboard, the food pantry run by the OU Dean of Students office. The Cupboard expects to continue operating, but at a reduced rate, after spring semester ends on May 6th.

As of late April, a total of 618 students and families have signed up during 2023 to shop at the Cupboard, which is located on the fifth floor of Baker Center. While inflation appears to have slowed somewhat, high prices continue to lead members to shop at the pantry.

Cupboard Coordinator Marilee Meyer is recruiting replacements for some student workers who will graduate and leave Athens. She and her colleagues have streamlined operations by hiring an online firm named

"Pantry Soft" to help record new memberships and keep track of orders. A member of the Cupboard can come once or twice a month to shop - more often in a few cases if special permission is granted. To date, such transactions have taken some time to be carried out and recorded.

A new Associate Dean in charge of Special Students Needs will help coordinate for next year.

Meyer and many students express deep gratitude, for the major contribution to this project by members and friends of FPC.

Each month, Meyer and her staff prepare a list of needed items. FPC member, Wendy Toadvine, shops for these items and takes them to the pick-up point, 4th floor entrance to Baker Center between

9:00-11:00 a.m. on the 2nd Tuesday of each month. In addition, a box has been set up for donations on the 2nd floor of Baker Center.

Wendy urges people to contribute monetary donations when possible, providing flexibility in shopping for needed items. Checks can be submitted to Jane Baker at the church office, 9 North College Street, Athens, OH 45701. "Cats' Cupboard" should be written on the memo line of each check. You can phone the church office if you have questions - 740-593-3351. Merilee Meyer's number is 740-593-1800.




Pentecost Offering Sunday, May 28th

June 2023 Newsletter Deadline Monday, May 22nd First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - FPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffy, author of the McGuffy's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
