From the Pastor....

"The people who walked in darkness have seen a great light. Those who dwelled in a land of deep darkness, on them light has shined. For a child has been born for us, a son given to us, Authority rests upon his shoulders, and his name shall be called Wonderful Counselor, Almighty God, Everlasting Father, Prince of Peace."

I was looking at these words earlier this week in preparing for one of the Christmas Eve services, and it stuck with me, the way Handel's music does, the way a reading you've heard for fifty-something years does. I read it after a friend commented that there seems to be an epidemic of hopelessness right now. And then Isaiah's words offered something I couldn't name.

Today I heard someone thank a bunch of us religious people because we offer hope. She said that without hope, there can never be change. And I realized that in the many trees of grief and pain and shock and despair, I had forgotten to take a step back and see the whole forest, whose canopy looks a bit like hope.

I've been thinking a lot lately about a story Jim Collins tells in Good to Great, a story about Admiral Stockdale, who was a prisoner of war in Viet Nam for three years and survived. Collins does better service to the story than this reflection, but I wanted to share Stockdale's words: "You must never confuse faith that you will prevail in the end – which you can never afford to lose – with the discipline to confront the most brutal facts of your current reality, whatever they might be."

Hope. Hope that brutality will not last forever. Hope that grief will feel more like a dull ache than an icy, rough

piercing. Hope that things will get better, whatever those things might be. And for me, as a Christian who really does believe all this Jesus stuff, and the miracles, and the promises, hope that God has not abandoned us to our worst selves, that God is moving in the midst of all that seems turbulent and immoral and wrong. I also have hope in the resurrection but it's sort of the wrong season for that.

So, I'll be seasonally correct. I think Christmas is, more than anything else, about hope. It's the hope that God is still at work. It's the hope that the life of a baby will change the world. It's the hope that God makes promises and fulfills them and we are better for that.

So, what do I hope for? That we'll figure out a way to prevent cancer and treat it more effectively. That we'll learn how to be there for each other. and that we'll get better at all the mental illness stuff. That we will never forget those who live in poverty, and that we will work tirelessly to make the deep changes necessary for poverty to be alleviated. That humane and thoughtful people will make the rules, with a real sense of liberty and justice for all.

Where we live, in the University town, it's sometimes strange to talk about God and say you believe in Jesus. The assumption is that you don't go to church. But I have this hope, at least for those of us who are hanging in there with church (or temple or mosque) that God will poke us this season and remind us of the Great Love that is not letting this world go to hell in a handbasket. Hope makes things bearable and beautiful.

Windows ON: Mission/Outreach Committee OHIO UNIVERSITY CATS' CUPBOARD

Cats' Cupboard is a food pantry run by the Ohio University Dean of Students. It continues to function well. Students can sign up to shop at least twice during each month.

Cupboard staff prepares a list of items in short supply at the pantry each month. Wendy Toadvine, FPC member, shops for these items and takes them to the pick-up point, the fourth floor entrance to Baker Center, between 9:00 and 11:00 a.m. on the second Tuesday of each month. In addition, a box has been set up for donations on the second floor of Baker Center. Wendy tends to purchase items not available from other sources.

Local football "star" Joe Burrow set up a foundation providing funds for food pantries and other charitable efforts in the Athens area. Some of this money goes to microgrants that help students and their families cope with special needs. The University's culinary department and Veterans' Affairs office have also raised funds for the Cupboard.

Wendy Toadvine notes the pantry has a special, continuing need for diapers and other personal-care items. (The Mission/Outreach Committee has a Diaper Donation box in the narthex of the church for diaper donations - see page 5.) She often buys small containers of cereal and two-pound bags of flour or sugar.

Other popular items include peanut butter, jelly and bread for sandwiches, rice, tomato soup, pasta sauce, fried and canned beans, and, of course, personal care items.

Wendy notes that many customers at the Cupboard pass the word to potential applicants. She explains that monetary donations provide flexibility in shopping. Jane Baker, church office administrator/financial secretary, notes that checks should have "Cats' Cupboard" in the memo line. Checks can be placed in the offering plate on Sunday, or mailed to the church office at 9 North College Street, Athens, OH 45701 or Chaz Canter's at 740-577-2916.

Each year during the Advent and Christmas Season, eyes are turned toward Bethlehem to celebrate the wondrous gift of Jesus Christ, our Savior.



The Christmas Joy Offering addresses the support needed by some church leaders, including supporting leadership development for communities of color, and providing support for Presbyterian church workers in their time of need.

By giving to the Christmas Joy Offering, you honor God's gift of Jesus Christ by providing assistance to current and retired church workers in their time of need and developing future leaders at Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color.

Supporting past, present, and future leaders. The Christmas Joy Offering has been a cherished Presbyterian tradition since the 1930s. The Offering distributes gifts equally to the Assistance Program of the Board of Pensions and to Presbyterian-related schools and colleges equipping communities of color. The Assistance Program provides critical financial support to church workers and their families. Presbyterian-related schools and colleges provide education and leadership development while nurturing racial and ethnic heritage. This has been a Presbyterian commitment for nearly 140 years.

- \$1.1 million in gifts from 2022 are being used to provide critical financial support and grants for current and retired Presbyterian church workers in their times of need.
- 272 individuals helped. Assisted retired church workers and surviving spouses.
- 223 recipients could afford to stay in their homes, assisted living or long-term care.
- 621 emergency assistant grants helped people facing economic hardship.

First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - FPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffey, author of the McGuffey's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
