From the Pastor....

As I have gotten older I have often been this hurt her. I still remember the way asked, "Looking back, what do you regret?"And I have answered. Sometimes, down, a little gut-kicked, as if, having just as you know, I will tell you even if you haven't asked. Sometimes, even when you've specifically requested I not tell you, I may still tell you.

So: What do I regret? Being poor from time to time? Not really. Working terrible jobs, like "putting in sprinkler systems in Florida, in the summer, with fire ants, alligators, and water moccasins" No. I don't regret that. My many failures in school, or at being a husband or a father? In an odd way, I think they helped me grow. But here's something I do regret:

In fifth grade, this new kid joined our class. In the interest of confidentiality, her she wasn't. End of story. name will be "ELLEN." Ellen was shy, had wild blonde hair, and lived in a small home that I passed every day going to and coming home from school. She wore these blue cat's-eye glasses that, at the time, only older women wore. When nervous, which was pretty much always, she had a habit of taking a strand of hair into her mouth and chewing on it.

So, she came to our school and our neighborhood, and was mostly ignored, occasionally teased ("Your hair taste good?" – that sort of thing). I could see she'd look after such an insult: eyes cast been reminded of her place in things, she was trying, as much as possible, to disappear. After awhile she'd drift away, hair-strand still in her mouth.

At home, I imagined, after school, her mother would say, you know: "How was your day, sweetie?" and she'd say, "Oh, fine." And her mother would say, "Making any friends?" and she'd go, "Sure, lots."

Sometimes I'd see her hanging around alone in her front yard, as if afraid to leave it. And then – she was gone. That was it. No tragedy, no big final hazing. One day she was there, next day

Now, why do I regret that? Why, fiftyseven years later, am I still thinking about it? I never said an unkind word to her. In fact, I sometimes even (mildly) defended her. But still. It bothers me. I quietly joined in the other kids' laughter and never said a word out loud in her defense. So, here's something I know to be true, although it's a little corny, and I don't quite know what to do with it: What I regret most in my life are failures of kindness.

Those moments when another human

(continued from page 1) being was there, in front of me, suffering, and I responded sensibly. Reservedly. Mildly.

Or, to look at it from the other end of the telescope: Who, in your life, do you remember most fondly, with the most undeniable feelings of warmth? Those who were kindest to you, I bet.

It may seem a little silly, maybe, and certainly hard to implement, but I'd say, as a goal in life, you could do worse than: Try to be kinder. Now, the million -dollar question: What's our problem? Why aren't we kinder? swing-sets, and low-hanging clouds and, you know, other people), and (3) we're permanent (death is real, o.k., sure – for you, but not for me).

Now, we don't really believe these things – intellectually we know better – but we believe them viscerally, and live by them, and they cause us to prioritize our own needs over the needs of others, even though what we really want, in our is hard – it starts out all rainbows and

hearts, is to be less selfish, more aware of what's actually happening in the present moment, more open, and more loving.

So, the second million-dollar question: How might we DO this? How might we become more loving, more open, less selfish, more present, less delusional, etc.? So, let me just say this. There are ways. You already know that because, in your life, there have been High Kindness periods and Low Kindness periods, and you know what inclined you toward the former and away from the latter.

Education is good; immersing ourselves in a work of art: good; prayer is good; a frank talk with a dear friend; establishing ourselves in a spiritual tradition – recognizing that there have been countless really smart people before us who have asked these same questions and left behind answers for us. Because kindness, it turns out,

puppy dogs, and expands to include... well, everything.

Hence, the theme for our stewardship campaign this year, "Cultivating Kindness."

We get our butts kicked by real life problems and people come to our defense, and help us, and we learn that we're not separate, and don't want to be. We see people near and dear to us dropping away, and are gradually convinced that maybe we too will drop away (someday, a long time from now).

Since, according to me, your life is going to be a gradual process of becoming kinder and more loving: Hurry up. Speed it along. Start right now. For kindness is humbly giving of ourselves in love and mercy to others. We invite you to join us in making a financial commitment to the church. Every gift tells a story of gratitude and kindness given and received, and makes a difference.

December 2025 Newsletter Deadline Wednesday, November 21st

First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio - FPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809. Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffey, author of the McGuffey's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

Presbytery of Scioto Valley - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.) - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers. Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
