From the Pastor....

I admit it, I am really feeling the countdown to retirement. Or, as I have been calling it, graduation! And it is a graduation, of sorts. You all have taught me so much and I will take it out into the world. Thank you! Like you, I have anxieties. What do I do on Sunday, April 12th? One of the hardest realities of retirement from ministry is that Barb and I can't come worship at First. I cannot do weddings and funerals. I cannot visit you in the hospital. I cannot take your calls to talk about the church. This is hard for me to write and perhaps hard for you to accept. Your job is to turn towards the new thing that God is doing. My job is to turn towards my new chapter and not to bring confusion or sow unintentional conflict.

If we see each other at the Community Center, Peden Stadium, the Convo, Donkey coffee, or on the street, OF COURSE we stop and greet and share what is going on in life. We will never stop caring for you all: "Blest be the tie that binds our hearts in Christian love!" And, frankly, when you call a new pastor that you are thrilled about, I may not want to hear about how great she is. How young and funny he is. How wonderful their sermons are and how swiftly the Session meetings fly by!! We will figure it out. Barb and I are so very grateful to you.

So, I wanted to give you a thumbnail sketch of the upcoming process.

Transition Update

The Session will meet with a liaison from the (Commission on Ministry) to learn what the steps are in the search process for a new pastor. In some ways it is a bit daunting. Yet, with the help and guidance of the Presbytery and common sense, it will all work out.

Here are the next steps:

1. My last Sunday is on April 5th. The Rev. Kathy Nice, our Executive Presbyter will preach on Sunday, April 12th.

2. Before then, the Session will call a Transitional (Interim) Pastor Nominating Committee. Working with the Presbytery, they will find a qualified pastor and make a recommendation to Session. Note: Finding a Transitional Pastor is an act of the Session not of the Congregation. A Transitional Pastor signs a contract for up to one year. Her or his job is to help the congregation get ready for the new called Pastor by listening and observing; guiding you into the next exciting stage. The hope is to have a Transitional Pastor either before my last Sunday or soon after.

3. The Nominating Committee works to form a Pastoral Search Committee (or Pastoral Nominating Committee). It is the hope of the Nominating Committee to find 7-9 persons who will say YES! to the awesome task of finding new pastoral leadership for First Presbyterian.

4. After the Congregation approves the Pastoral Search Committee, the committee will complete a Mission Study, fill out all the forms describing our church, and release it all into the world – and the search begins.

Calling a new pastor can take up to a year from the time the Search Committee begins its work. It will all come to fruition when their candidate, who has been approved by the Presbytery, preaches at First Presbyterian Church and the congregation votes. It will be one of the most wonderful days ever!

While the Search Committee has the awesome task of finding the new pastor, the rest of you have important work too. Keep coming to worship. Pray for the committee. Give generously and support the programs and mission and staff.

You are about to enter a Kairos time, an in-between time, a creative and slightly chaotic time... God time. It is not empty time. It is certainly not time to step back and just wait.

ASH WEDNESDAY SERVICE

February 18th
5:30 p.m.

Ash Wednesday begins the season of Lent with a public act of confession and contrition. Acknowledging that all have sinned and fallen short of the glory of God, we stand in solidarity as fellow creatures before our Creator, acutely aware of our mortality. In the face of our mortality, we pledge ourselves anew to live unto God's Word in Jesus Christ, the eternal Word that remains forever.

Historically, Ash Wednesday was a time when penitents were presented for church discipline during Lent, culminating in reconciliation on Maundy Thursday. Ash Wednesday is also the occasion when would-be disciples of Christ known as catechumens were enrolled in the catechumenate, a special time of learning the basics of the faith in preparation for baptism on Easter Sunday or during the Easter Vigil. In some traditions, Ash Wednesday is a fast day, beginning the Lenten time of fasting and preparation for the Great Three Days that culminate in Easter.

448-6401. The tentative theme for Bible study, morning watch, nature study, crafts is "Every Day is Earth Day."




This Transition Lenten Study is an opportunity to listen and share together in discerning strengths for our shared ministry. The study involves gathering data and information about the church. It is broadly framed by these three questions:

1. Where have we been? (Our history,)
2. Where are we now? (Our current realities.)

3. Where do we believe God is calling us? (A sense of our vision for the future.)

According to Presbyterian polity, there are distinct responsibilities for the congregation, session, and presbytery during the transition between pastors. Following the departure of a pastor a mission study is conducted prior to a new pastor receiving a call.

- The Congregation: The congregation's responsibility is to participate faithfully in the mission study, and to pray regularly for those leading the congregation. During this time, the congregation may choose to study the basics of Presbyterian polity as outlined in the Book of Order.
- The Session: The Session is responsible for appointing the mission study team/task force,

naming a moderator, and providing necessary funding and resource support, and for maintaining open communication with the Presbytery of Scioto Valley Commission on Ministry. The team appointed by Session should be inclusive of the diversity of the congregation in terms of race, ethnicity, age, sex, disability, geography, or theological conviction.

## Windows ON: Christian Education Committee "SOUPER" BOWL SUNDAY

It began in 1990, a simple prayer: "Lord, even as we enjoy the Super Bowl football game, help us be mindful of those who are without a bowl of soup to eat" was delivered to a small youth group at Spring Valley Presbyterian Church in Columbia, SC led by Brad Smith, who was serving as a seminary intern at the time.

This gave birth to an idea. Why not harness the energy and enthusiasm of Super Bowl week-end, a time when people come together for football, food and fun, to unite the nation for a higher good? Individuals and groups could collect dollars in

soup pots and canned food for those in need and send every dollar and food donation DIRECTLY to a local charity of THEIR choice.

The first year they invited 22 churches to join them and raised \$5,700 for local charities.

This year the youth of Athens First are inviting congregation members to donate to local hunger causes. The youth will be available in person to collect donations on February 8th following worship. Congregation members unable to attend can send a check made out to Athens First to the

## SHROVE TUESDAY PANCAKE SUPPER February 17th from 5:30-7:00 p.m. Fellowship Hall

Who doesn't like breakfast for dinner? Come and celebrate Fat Tuesday or Shrove Tuesday on February 17th, beginning at 5:30 p.m. in Fellowship Hall with pancakes and sausage for dinner. There will be King Cake to enjoy for dessert.



The name Shrove comes from the old word "shrive" which means to confess. In the Middle Ages, people would confess their sins on Shrove Tuesday to begin the penitent Lenten season with a clean slate. Shrove Tuesday is a day of celebration as well as repentance. Lent is historically a time of giving things up, so Shrove Tuesday is the last chance to indulge. Pancakes are eaten on this day because they contain fat, butter, and eggs (significant, flavorful food groups which were forbidden during Lent).

## **Presbyterians advocate for Haitian neighbors as a federal judge blocks, for now, an end to temporary protective status.**

A federal judge on Monday blocked the Trump administration from terminating temporary protective status for Haitians. The decision came a day before this program, a safe haven from deportation, was expected to end. A spokesperson for Department of Homeland Security said on social media that the government would appeal the decision to the U.S. Supreme Court.

In Springfield, Ohio, where 15,000 Haitian people depend on the program, the worse news was that later in the week, they expected that federal detention officers would come to town to begin deportations. Even in the midst of this fear though clergy and worshipers of many faiths from Springfield to Spokane, Washington, surrounded neighbors in love and advocacy. St. John Missionary Baptist Church in Springfield, Ohio, Filled to standing-room-only Monday morning.

With hundreds in the pews, clergy of many faiths stood near the front. Others were scattered among the crowd. They prayed. They sang. Beyond the worship, advocacy endures. Temporary protective status offers immigrants legal standing, worker permits and protection from deportation. It first was offered to Haitian immigrants living in the U.S. after the 2010 catastrophic earthquake that destroyed much of the capital city, Port-au-Prince, and other cities.

The Rev. Jody Noble, pastor of Covenant Presbyterian Church in Springfield, was among the many clergy present Monday morning. "I am so grateful for the court's extension of TPS and this opportunity for our Haitian brothers and sisters to live safely here in our country," she said on Monday evening. "I also recognize that TPS was still in force when ICE actions in major cities occurred and ask for the continued prayers for God's peace to reign in our communities," she added. The scope of the community's outreach for their Haitian neighbors was vast, Noble said. "We also had a two-hour prayer time [Sunday] evening where we thought 50 people from our canopy churches would come," Noble said. "And we had more than 150 people from a wide variety of churches in Springfield and Clark County."

Like they have in years past, the community of Springfield is standing up for their neighbors. Not that long ago, this former manufacturing municipality faced enormous economic issues. As companies left, so did the jobs. With too few jobs available, workers had to leave. Local leaders revitalized downtown and attracted more companies. By then they had jobs, but no workers. So, the city invited immigrants to fill the positions, and the immigrants from Haiti were happy to oblige.

They did more than just fill the jobs. They opened businesses, spent money locally, and bought homes. Springfield thrived. As many as 20,000 people from Haiti, many of them on TPS, settled in Springfield and surrounding communities. Since then, they have opened at least 10 new businesses, including seven markets, restaurants, and a food truck. A number of them worship in two area Presbyterian churches as well as several other places of worship. The Federal Reserve Bank of Cleveland reported that Springfield economy saw the second-largest growth in Ohio since the pandemic. The city's economy grew 2.3% from February 2020 through March 2024. But life in Springfield has not been easy for immigrants from Haiti.

In September 2024, then-candidate for President Donald Trump amplified a now defunct claim by then-candidate for Vice President JD Vance that Haitians in Springfield were stealing and eating pets. Vance has since admitted this was a lie, but the damage was immediate. Schools in Springfield were closed; death threats were made and the Haitian community lived in fear. Should they be subject to ICE arrest, that fear is multiplied for all Haitians threatened with loss of TPS.

Community advocacy is essential, according to Catherine Gordon, representative for international issues with Presbyterian Office of Public Witness. "Local, public advocacy matters profoundly in moments like this," she said, "when people are being taken off the streets, families being torn apart. "Visible, collective action — showing up together, praying publicly, and standing alongside Haitian neighbors — is how communities refuse to normalize fear, abuse of power, and the violation of basic rights."

**First Presbyterian Church, Athens, Ohio** - FPC has occupied its site in the center of Athens, Ohio since 1809.

Among the founding fathers was Ohio University's first president, a Presbyterian minister, the Rev. Jacob Lindley. Dr. Lindley served this congregation as Moderator and Pastor until 1824. Over the years, thirteen pastors of the church have been either university presidents or members of the faculty. Dr. William Holmes McGuffey, author of the McGuffey's Readers, was called to serve as President of Ohio University and served as pastor of the church in 1839.

**Presbytery of Scioto Valley** - The Presbytery of Scioto Valley encompasses twenty-six counties in south central Ohio. From Ironton in the south to Ibera in the north: Hanover in the east and London in the west, FPC's presbytery consists of 95 congregations many of them historic where Presbyterians today are carrying on a long tradition of witness and service in their communities. All over FPC's presbytery, Presbyterians reach out to welcome the stranger, sharing the Gospel and God's love as Christ bids us to do.

**Presbyterian Church (U.S.A.)** - The PC (U.S.A.), with denominational offices in Louisville, Kentucky, has approximately 2.3 million members, more than 10,000 congregations and 14,000 ordained and active ministers.

Presbyterians trace their history to the 16th century and the Protestant Reformation. Its heritage, and much of its doctrine began with John Calvin (1509-1564), whose writings crystallized much of the Reformed thinking that preceded him.
